

She has been an Assistant Governor, presenter in Governors Institutes, and speaker in Rotary Clubs conventions and meetings, here in the United States and abroad, including South Africa and Jamaica.



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CLUB NEWS: Dickinson

Rotary Club of Dickinson receives more than \$110,000 to help two Dickinson organizations with Hurricane Harvey recovery

Hurricane Harvey may have devastated the M.I. Lewis Social Service Center and the Dickinson First United Methodist Church when it pounded the Gulf Coast in late August; however, the road to hurricane recovery will come a little faster for these groups thanks to three grants requests awarded to the Rotary Club of Dickinson totaling more than \$110,000. Both of these long-time groups are special to the Rotary Club of Dickinson, as they have served the Dickinson community for many years.

M.I. Lewis Social Service Center received \$76,405 from two different grant requests. The first totaled \$65,000 from the Rotary International Gulf Coast Disaster Relief Committee, while the other \$11,405 grant came from District 5910 Disaster Relief Foundation Fund. This money will go a long way toward helping rebuild the M.I. Lewis Social Service Center which is located near the FM 517 and I-45 intersection. This area of Dickinson was severely hit with Hurricane Harvey flood waters. The center's office received over 5 feet of water, completely destroying the facility, equipment and the food pantry supplies, which meets the needs of hundreds of families each year.

The center was fortunate to quickly set up temporary office space at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church; however, there is very limited room making it impossible for the organization to collect and distribute food supplies until they can get their office restored. M.I. Lewis serves hundreds of families each year living within the Dickinson ISD

attendance zones. The Rotary Club of Dickinson is a long-time supporter of M.I. Lewis with monthly donations as well as support for special projects.

Another recipient of a Rotary Gulf Coast Donor Advised Fund Grant is the Dickinson First United Methodist Church, which received \$35,000 to help replace kitchen equipment lost when Hurricane Harvey flood waters damaged the church facility also located on FM 517. For over 40 years, not only has the church been the location for the club's weekly meetings, but the church women's group has provided home-cooked meals for every meeting. Since September, the Rotary Club of Dickinson has been temporarily meeting in the Dickinson ISD Education Support Center; however, club members are eagerly awaiting the return to the church for weekly meetings once the restoration is complete. In addition to Rotary, First United Methodist Church is also home to several community organizations, Boy Scouts, and Mother's Day Out. Because of damage from Harvey, the opening of a preschool for the community has been delayed.

Dickinson is rebounding from Harvey damage, and the Rotary Club of Dickinson is very grateful for the generous support provided by Rotary International and District 5910 to help our community.
