



The All-American Soap Box Derby, "The Greatest Amateur Racing Event in the World," is a youth gravity racing program for boys and girls 7-18 years of age. The mission of the Derby has not changed since its inception in 1934: to promote families working together, to leach children basic skills of workmanship along with the spirit of competition, and the perseverance to continue a project to completion.

The annual Southeast Texas Soap Box Derby is the service project of the Spindletop Rotary Club (Beaumont). Annually, the proceeds raised from the Derby provide college scholarships to the nine (9) Derby winners and six (6) B.1.S.D. middle school education grants. In addition to the scholarships and grants awarded, 50% of the Derby proceeds will be donated to Girls' Haven. Girls' Haven offers a safe home to young girls that have been affected by homelessness, physical and sexual abuse, and severe family dysfunction. The Spindletop Rotary Club is a non-profit 501(c)3 organization and your donation will be acknowledged for tax purposes.
