DISTRICT GRANTS: REVISED METHODOLOGY

District Grant Opportunities, as of September 10:

1. District Grants are available to Clubs who have completed the necessary grants training and have a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in file with the District.
2. The maximum match from the District is \$3,000 with a minimum of \$1,000, equal to the Club's contribution.
3. Clubs which applied for district grants by June 1 received grants totaling approximately \$53,000 in August.
4. Final reports are due by May 1, 2018.
5. Rotary International has recognized the devastation and destruction caused by Hurricane Harvey. We have the opportunity to revise our district grant applications. If your club's circumstances have changed and you wish to reallocate funds to a different project, or request additional funds, **Rotary has given us the latitude to revise our District Grant for the 2017-2018 year. We need to know right away if you would like to make any changes. We have an additional \$10,000 (approximately) in funds which may be used for district grant projects related to Hurricane relief.**
6. The time frame is compressed and the projects must be completed and the final report filed by May 1, 2018.
7. Grant applications need to be submitted to Dave Johnson and Walter Hinkle **ASAP**.

District Membership & Development Chair, Demetress Harrell provided an inspiring presentation during our recent seminar on the campus of Lone Star College in Conroe.



As vested Rotarians we must maintain the interest to encourage individuals to join Rotary and become a part of the largest service organization in the world. District 5910 has a very impressive membership goal and we must work aggressively to attain this objective.

Demetress is optimistic that we will succeed and has challenged our 39 clubs to retain their current membership and induct at least two new members before April 1, 2018.



Grow your club by recruiting new members while defining distinction. Make your eyeballs pop by sharing Rotary with new potential members and resuscitating Rotary in District 5910.



Demetress awarded certificates to those clubs who have already begin the membership growth and motivated them to continue to build goodwill in our District. Of our 39 clubs, 25 have reported membership goals to Rotary International, our goal for the District is 2,345 with a current membership of 2,260 up from our July 1, number of 2,233. Our

year to date retention is 95.51% so we have some progressive steps to take over the next several months.



One of the major issues is that clubs clean their rosters at the end of the calendar year and never regain the loss but this Rotary year we are going to prove the power of membership by breathing new life into District 5910. Resuscitating your Rotary Club membership begins with you and we all should be devoted to growing our individual clubs and finding new members with the desire to be lifetime members.

It is not productive to bring members in who have no desire to make a long term

commitment to your Club. Membership is an obligation of your entire club and begins with me as the team motivator.

Here are a few basic essentials for you to consider:

- Take time to recruit like-minded Rotarians and impact the connectivity to District 5910.
- Take time to maintain club data online to assure your membership information is up to date and accurate.
- Take time to report club information within 30 days of any changes and take time to review your membership on or near January 1 and July 1.
- Take time to confirm addresses of current members and assure they do not get behind on their membership dues.
- Take time to visit new businesses in your communities and invite members to join you for a meeting as a potential member.
- Take time to think of Rotary and breath life into your vibrant club.
- Take time to complete chest compressions on those who appear to be losing focus or have been absent from your meetings this year.
- Take time to make our 2017-2018 year one of the most successful in our Rotary Membership history.
- Take time to remember the value of Rotary and the changes we make around the world everyday.
- Take time to support the impeccable leadership of our District Governor and the work in our incredible 39 clubs.
- Take time to remember this number 85.....we need to attain 85 members without losing any current members therefore it will be imperative to maintain accurate records of our membership count in each of our 39 clubs.

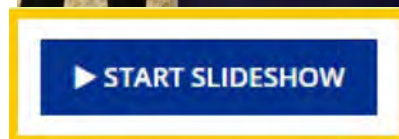
